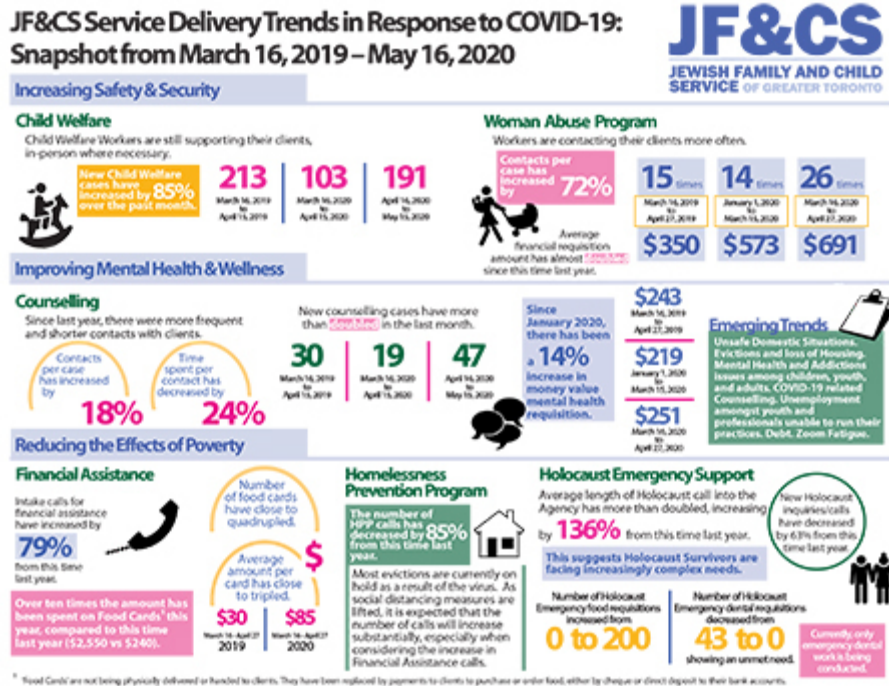

In March of this year we formalized our commitment to the LGBTQ+ Jewish Community when we took part in the Keshet Leadership Training to learn and grow our entire organization to be more supportive and inclusive for clients, colleagues, board members, community members and each other.



What's it like in our Woman Abuse Department during a Pandemic?

Working in the social services during a pandemic is something that no one could have prepared for.

Working from home and working with clients remotely is challenging in ways that have required a shift, or in the language of COVID-19, have

required us to pivot into new ways of working. At this time, staff are also dealing with some of the same COVID-19 related concerns as many of our clients.

Woman Abuse staff are reporting that the clients are sharing experiences during the pandemic that are highlighting gaps in services that have always been there but are now more pronounced and being accentuated during COVID-19. There are issues with the police, the courts, children's aid societies, and often high conflict professionals. Women rarely come into a (virtual) session without a story involving one of these systems. The pandemic is highlighting the reparative work necessary in a post Coronavirus world to our social systems. Hopefully, this work will happen sooner rather than later.
